

Thank you for your letter dated April 3rd 2025 regarding your land-based priorities for the coming months.

We have spent a protracted four and a half years working with your Department and the National Regulator on a Cambling Act Review, which included a White Paper (published 2 years ago this week) containing proposals that you said last year you were "broadly supportive of". You also said in your speech to the GambleAware conference last December that; "In Opposition Labour supported the 2022 genera. In Government, we will continue to do so . I want to work with you all, with the GambleGover in Government, we will continue to do so . I want the work with you all, with the GambleGovernussian and with the gentition industry, to continue to deliver the key reforms it sets out. I fancer many of you are experted hear our plans".

It is therefore most disappointing that those proposals are only selectively being progressed through with no clear definitive road map. All businesses require certainty to be able to invest and grow. Defineing the remainder of the While Paper in its entirety would help us to help the Government in this objective.

It is reassuring to hear that the Government recognises the importance of FECs, longo clubs and perhaps casinos. It is also helpful to know that the Government appreciates that the FEC sector's GGV is lower than it was before Govid-19 and that you want to see these venues thrive. However, it is not just the FEC sector that is in this position. Please see below a factual chart using the Gambling Commission's ledustry Data that clearly shows a real term decline in consumer spending in ALL land based sectors, not just FECs.

This decline is having a negative impact on our high streets, especially outside of the M25. We are avere that there are those who do not agree with any gambling activity, and is a consequence, they campaign hard to reduce the number of gambling versues even further. Conversely, land-based (verse) gambling for the vast majority who take part is their social interaction, their fan and enjoyment, and lesses time. Sometimes their 'only' lesser time and 'only' human interaction.


It should be noted that whilst AGCs were singled out is your letter regarding risks to the vulnerable, every land-based sector is working cleanly and collaboratively with the Gambiag Commission to continually improve the way in which they protect and interact with counsmers. We are acutely aware that the provision of gambiag products and services requires high levels of consumer protections (as do many retail propositions). Sambling is subsequently ingulated at a very high level, especially when compared to all other retail verticals.

If there are "individual instances" of non-compliance then the National Regulator has the power, the ability and the basic job to address this on an individual basis. The GBG and it's Members do not believe it is fair that a whole sector is hald back because of the behaviour of individual Bicenses.

In this regard, we would be very lisen to facilitatis showing you how the AGC/Arcade sector protects its consumers as you have requested in your letter. Our Members are more than happy to host site visits or meetings in line with your availability.

Land-based gambling is also having to deal with all of the other challenges posed such as increased employers National Insurance contributions, increases in National Minimum Wage rates and the most expensive energy costs in Europe. We are expecting more versues to close as a result of these pressures.

This is therefore a critical time for the whole land-based gambling sector, a time where we need all the help and support it can get, including from you as our Minister for Gambling.



- Reported GGV for land-based gambling as a whole is 2023/24 was the same as it was in 2008/09.
- Zero growth in 15 years against 2.9% average inflation every year and a 10% growth in population.

All land-based sectors need your support by delivering all relevant proposals in the White Paper. We are aware of the current Government's objective for growth, and to single out subsectors for support is at best a missed opportunity, at worst it is potentially very damaging to those excluded.

Similarly, singling out Catagory D machines for a neview of stakes and prizes is effectively determining the outcome of a Triennial Briskew (for all machines) without gathering and evaluating the factual evolvence available to inform sacch a selective devicion.

There is no mention is your letter of the hard work and effort that your Department has contributed towards the White Paper proposal to remove the debit card prohibition (cashess) when playing gaining machines. This charge is necessary net for growth or development, it is critical fee landhesed gambling as a whole to catch up with all other retail basinesses who have been processing digital cash for many years. Whitout the removal of this archaic piece of legitlation, gaming machines will investibly double parallelater.

Below is a chart produced again from the Gambling Commission's Industry Data that shows a one third decline in the number of licenced gambling venues between 2011 and 2024. Contrary to some antigambling opinions, there are 4000 fewer venues today than there were in 2011, with the largest decline in Betting Shops and AGCs.
